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### **Tour Report**

#### Day 1: Arrive Chania, Agias Lake

#### Tuesday 5 April 2022

Weather: Overcast with a cool north breeze, 20°C

The afternoon flight arrived on time and we successfully met in the airport and we transferred to our minibus, (then a different minibus!), and proceeded to Alexis Hotel that delighted us all by its wonderful views looking out over the sea. A cup of tea and some botanising outside the hotel led to a hummingbird hawkmoth feeding on Viper's bugloss and we saw a broomrape *Phelipanche* (no common name - that we later saw elsewhere and didn't work out what the host was), and we all had great views of a circling sparrowhawk. A short drive to Agia Lake was taken before dinner and some gentle birdwatching was a suitable activity after a long day of travel for all. Here we saw a range of waterbirds, including female ferruginous duck, pochard, gadwall and shoveler. A marsh harrier was seen, as were both terrapins, the native stripe-necked and introduced redeared. Plants included our first *serapias* identification challenge and a tassel hyacinth.

#### Day 2: Akrotiri Peninsula

#### Wednesday 6 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day with some light cloud, 21°C

Our first destination was Venizelos Graves looking for migrants. Although quiet for birds with no migrants, there were plenty of cats! Good views over Chania were had and we caught up with Italian sparrow and a few exotic plants and trees; holly blue and speckled wood were seen. Next, we proceeded to Stavros and the nearby Tersanas Pond. Birds again perhaps were rather disappointing, with only a few sand martins amongst larger numbers of barn swallows. We had good views of Sardinian warbler and many tree pipits were passing over head; a bee-eater was heard, no doubt quite high up on its migration. Moving around to some agricultural land, we saw a swallowtail egg-laying on a giant fennel and later a brown argus. More tree pipits were flushed from the field and a pair of crested lark were seen. We were delighted by a whinchat that sat on the wire as we returned to the minibus. We had all been botanising with Janet working through the tricky serapias orchids.

Our lunchtime destination was to be Moni Triaga, and under the shade of a blue gum we enjoyed the warm temperatures and passing serins. Travelling on through some good maquis habitat we arrived at Moni Gouverneto, where we saw many exotic trees and shrubs, red admiral, more serins, joined by linnets, turkeys and another whinchat. Beyond the monastery we descended into some beautiful coastal garrigue and encountered four-spotted orchid, sparse-flowered orchid and then incredibly and briefly saw a spectacular male pallid harrier, then on the way back had great views of our first black-eared wheatear. Back at the car park we saw a tame chukar, and whilst looking at the that, the pallid harrier flew past again and was now seen by all! As if the harrier could possibly be bettered, we went on to see two *aquila* eagles, that initially were thought to be steppe eagles, but later were identified as Eastern imperial eagles. We ended the day having a most welcome beer on the way back to the hotel.

#### Day 3: Agia Lake, Botanical Gardens of Crete, Omalos Plateau

#### Thursday 7 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day with some light cloud, 21°C

Our arrival at Agia Lake was greeted by a small flock of glossy ibis flying around, that eventually moved off and didn't settle. This initial impression of birds on migration was backed-up by hearing and briefly seeing a pair of hawfinch in the tops of trees, corn buntings passing flying north and a quite mesmerising flock of four





purple herons slowly and cautiously descending, until they eventually settled into the reedbed on the other side of the lake. A squacco heron was seen resting inconspicuously, eventually seen by all. Hirundines and swifts were plentiful for a short while, including a spectacular group of Alpine swift gracefully drinking from the lake; a wonderful start to the day.

Our next destination was the Botanical Gardens of Crete. Whilst not brimming with birds and native wildlife, the botanical collection was interesting with much labelling and interesting interpretation explaining plant uses etc., and there were many stunning exotic species on display, and many in flower in a quite beautiful valley-side setting.

From here we proceed up hill to the Omalas Plateau, where we stopped at various interesting looking places. We saw the unusual *Daphne sericea* in a small arid cultivated valley where we also connected with our first woodchat shrike, Eastern black-eared wheatear and a couple of whitethroats. Later we saw many griffon vultures and eventually saw a distant bearded vulture. Northern wheatears seemed to have just arrived, as half a dozen males were all feeding together in a field. On our arrival at a breezy Samaria Gorge, we were all a bit disappointed at the taverna not being open! Passing chough, griffons and some crag martins were observed and we took the group photo against the back drop of snow-capped mountain-scene of the gorge. Our last stop of the day as we descended back into the plateau was some of the flooded areas by the reservoir, where we had good views of green toads mating, with accompanying woodlarks.

## Day 4: Armeni Minoan Cemetery, Kotsiphos Gorge, Plakias Beach, Moni Preveli, Turkish Bridge, Kourtalitiko Gorge, Spili Plateau

#### Friday 8 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day, 23°C

Our first stop was the enchanting site that is the Armeni Late Minoan Cemetery, with its open orchard-like woodland of vallonia oak, where many observed its huge acorns and coarsely textured cups. Orchids abounded, with the first of many being the impressive giant orchid. Other plants seen included many more orchid species, including sawfly and one of the woodcock orchids; the yellow draba and butcher's broom were also encountered for the first time. The tombs themselves were variable in their size and the walls had marks made by bronze hand tools – astounding to think these had been made over 3,000 years ago; a truly wonderful place to spend some time on this perfect sunny morning.

We continued inland to the impressive Kotsiphos Gorge, where we had a wonderful walk ingesting many new plant species, including the casmophyte, *linium arboretum*. Another arum, the curious Friar's cowl was seen for the first time, showing its strange striped tubular spathe. Cleopatra and Cretan festoon were seen and skilfully captured by our group photographer. After picking up two of the group we proceeded to a relatively built-up Plakias beach for our lunch. Our next stop was Moni Preveli, in its beautiful and remote setting with its bizarre menagerie that included Canada geese, emus and llamas. The church and a huge Turkish pine and interesting architecture were enjoyed highlights, though the monks were cleaning the toilets, thus preventing us using these facilities was a terrible disappointment as that was a key reason we were there!

Driving alongside the Megalopotamos Valley, we reached the beautiful Turkish bridge where only one of the group saw a hoopoe. We proceeded further inland and the wide Kourtalitiko Gorge, with many griffon vultures, crag martins, Alpine swifts and a pair of Bonelli's eagle, the latter watched for a long period, gracefully interacting with each other on what was almost certainly a nest site. Jackdaws and ravens were plentiful and made for a very bird-filled blue sky over a spectacular and wide gorge setting.

Spili Plateau was reached with a couple of hours to spare, and on reaching what the botanist's call 'Spili bumps' we immediately were into lots of orchids by the minibus. Apart from being confused by some huge variability and hybrids we were able to identify milk orchid, Bory's orchid, few-flowered orchid, a few kinds



of ophris and the beautiful pale pink Cretan tulip was at its prime and giving a fabulous display. Our last stop of the day was to look at a patch of narcissus tazetta along a trackside. Corn buntings were singing their jingling songs the whole time we were there, creating atmosphere in what felt like and ancient unspoilt landscape that made a wonderful finale to a very full day, where we inevitably were rather late back for dinner.

#### Day 5: Agias Lake and Irini Gorge

#### Saturday 9 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day, later with cloud in the mountain, 21°C

After the last couple of hectic days, a more relaxed day was required by all, though we did start early with a visit to Agia Lake again, with the minibus nearly driving itself. Our arrival was met by a beautiful low sun that slightly hindered viewing but was as usual made up for by so many birds. Sand martins abounded with swallows and our first motionless night heron in sub-adult plumage. Reed and sedge warblers were seen, and we were all delighted by a well seen wood warbler. Tree sparrows were later encountered, and one of the group saw a hoopoe. We returned to our hotel for our well-earned breakfast.

One hour drive away was the Irini Gorge, our next destination. All the gorges were quite different, and we all enjoyed this one in particular as there was no road access and was full of spectacular trees, both Oriental planes following the river bed and Turkish pines and cypresses on the slopes. Wildflowers abounded with much botanising done. The plane trees had been pollarded some time ago and were gnarled and swollen with hollows and exposed roots dipping into the clear stream. The pines were pollinating and creating a yellowish mist as we looked down the gorge.

On our way back we stopped at a village taverna where one of the group treated us to drinks and we enjoyed the atmosphere of this remote location with local folk coming and going. For a change we had a sensible finishing time and an hour to relax before doing our checklist and eating our last huge evening meal at the Alexi's Hotel.

#### Day 6: Moronis rivermouth, Commonwealth Memorial Cemetery, Souda Bay, Georgioupolis river, Knossas

#### Sunday 10 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day, later with cloud in the mountain, 21°C

A travel day due east and we headed first of all to Moronis River mouth just outside Chania. Our first birds were squacco heron and common sandpiper. Later a wonderful greenshank flew down and alighted opposite us before rapidly disappearing, emitting its characteristic 'tu-tu-tu' call and was nicely captured on camera by one of the group. Some new plants were identified that included Cretan mallow and samphire. A walk along the beach allowed two of the group to search for animals and indulge themselves in their favourite littoral-zone habit. A quick drive to the Souda Commonwealth Graves memorial was sobering and a chance to better understand what happened to the Allied troops in Crete during WW2.

Our next stop was Geogioupolis with its reed and tree-fringed river mouth. Parking by the national highway, we overlooked this wetland in perfect light and saw garganey, stripe-necked terrapin, and beautiful clear spring fed water. A cuppa and a break in the town itself was relaxing by the quiet town square.

We moved on further east to Knossos, leaving us with a couple of hours to explore this most famous of archaeological sites. As is often the way with nature lovers, our interest was taken by the wildlife rather than the ruins themselves. A calling hoopoe was tantalising, but due to the restricted access we couldn't investigate. A passing peregrine was watched by some of us, as many other tourists passed us curious as to



what we looking at! The ruins themselves, whilst fascinating, were excavated and parts of it re-built by Sir Arthur Evans – the re-building aspect seemed confusing to most of us.

From here we made the short drive to our hotel, the Villa Mare, where we eventually checked in via our phones and old-style form-filling out of doors, thus experiencing more varied Greek Covid prevention measures. After settling in, we had a pleasant meal in new surroundings with far more manageable portions than the previous hotel.

#### Day 7: Selenari Gorge, Maquis by hotel, Aposelemis river, Krasi

#### Monday 11 April 2022

Weather: Sunny all day, later with cloud in the mountain, 21°C

A trip to the nearby Selenari Gorge before breakfast was planned as a way of seeing the griffon vultures leave the cliffs to start their day. Unfortunately, we hadn't bargained for near gale force winds and it being very cold indeed. However, we braved the weather for a while and returned for breakfast.

After some exploring of the wonderful maquis by our hotel, our next stop was Aposelemis river and salt marsh. A walk along the river produced views of stripe-necked turtle and we heard our first great reed warbler singing deep in the bamboo-like reeds. Doubling back along the river we took the minibus around to the saltmarsh and seashore edge. Here we had lunch and met a Dutchman who was quite shocked at how much good habitat had been filled-in since his last visit, we were all so sad to hear about this. In the limited habitat remaining, we saw wood sandpipers, a Temminck's stint, greenshank and a nice group of active ruff. Small brown birds suddenly came to the fore, as resident crested larks were joined by a tawny pipit, a pair of greater short-toed larks, a red-throated pipit, and yellow wagtails. Out at sea we could see Scopoli's shearwaters banking and rising briefly above the horizon and also a gull-billed tern made an appearance that we all eventually saw.

Our last stop of the day was the hill village of Krasi, the home of the largest tree on Crete, an Oriental plane. Arriving in the cool air in the village square we spotted not one but two plane trees by the water fountains, with the larger of the two being rumoured to be over 2,400 years old. This was our last stop of the day and indeed our tour as we returned to pack and reflect on our enjoyable week's wildlife watching in near perfect weather before had dinner together for the last time.

#### Day 8: Travel to Chania airport
