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

Day 1: Pick-up and first birding hours in Oostvaardersplassen

Thursday 17 August 2023

Despite an early hiccup when a group member missed her flight from London, we had a pleasant start to the trip (after a few calls with the group member, it was arranged that she would take an afternoon flight and meet us in Groningen).

The rest of us left for the Oostvaardersplassen for our first hours of birdwatching. This area is located on the route towards our hotel and always offers a good introduction to the world of Dutch summer birding. It turned out to be an excellent start indeed with, among other things, white-tailed eagles (the first birds we saw when we got out of the minivan!), Caspian and yellow-legged gull, spotted redshank, ruff, huge numbers of ruddy shelduck, little stint, black tern and raven all showing well.

Day 2: Frisian Wadden coast

Friday 18 August 2023

One of the main reasons the English travel to the Netherlands is to see waders. Westhoek is one of the main wader sites in Northwestern Europe and this destination was on the program for today. Due to the eastern winds, the tideline stayed just a bit further away than we had hoped, so the sightings weren't as spectacular as they could have been. Though still fantastic nevertheless! We took in clouds of waders, the vastness of the Wadden Sea and quite a few migratory songbirds overhead.

It was a songbird that won the title of "rarest bird of the day." A Tawny pipit flew past, calling several times and disappearing westwards. I can't remember when I last saw this species in the Netherlands. It was a very nice encounter, although most group members didn't manage to hear or recognize the call.

In terms of waders, we saw everything you could expect, but the always hoped-for rarity did not turn up among the masses on this occasion. Of course, you can't have it all and to say "rare birds are rare" is stating the obvious, but of course very true. However, plenty of days go by without seeing curlew sandpiper, little stint, knot, golden and grey plover, bar-tailed godwit, whimbrel and many of the other more common waders, all in fine weather so, having seen these, you won't hear us complaining!

On our journey via Noorderleech and the pier of Holwerd, we saw lots of waders, but nothing we hadn't seen before. We eventually ended up in the Ezumakeeg. The afternoon light was perfect and there were plenty of birds to see. In short, it was great, good old bird watching! We found an interesting species, a juvenile whitewinged Tern which was inconspicuous among the many waders! Furthermore, the group was very happy with, among other sightings, three Temminck's stints and the first Caspian terns of the trip.

Day 3: Northeast Groningen

Saturday 19 August 2023

In addition to waders, English birders seem to really look forward to seeing another Dutch speciality: Montagu's harrier. This species can't be found on the other side of the Channel, so a trip to Oldambt is an absolute must!

The group was very lucky because more young Montagu's harriers hatched this year than any other I can recall. It was a very good year for mice and that pays off immediately. Not only did we see many Montagu's harriers, of all ages and plumages, but we also saw many other birds of prey. The number of kestrels, common buzzards and marsh harriers was impressive, and we even saw a pair of hen harriers. In winter this species is omnipresent, but as breeding birds, they are unfortunately extremely scarce nowadays.

Other sightings included bluethroats, yellowhammers, a sparrowhawk, a calling grey partridge and, as we passed along one of the fields, a quail just flew up from just a metre in front of me. I was able to follow the bird for quite a long time and it therefore became my best Dutch quail sighting ever! Unfortunately, everyone in the group missed the bird, which casts a small blemish on the sighting.





In the afternoon, it was high tide in the Dollard, so we chose our next destination quickly: Breebaartpolder! This inland high-tide refuge is a bit all or nothing. If the tide does not rise high enough, the waders remain on the outer side of the dike on the Wadden Sea, at high (enough) tide they come inside in large numbers. Which is fortunately what happened today!

The spectacle was even bigger and more impressive than yesterday because large groups of birds landed right in front of us. The dynamics, the sound of thousands of waders, and the beautiful views of the different species were truly unparalleled and were received with great enthusiasm. As a bonus, two Caspian terns landed in front of the bird hide and a wryneck hopped off the path into the scrub at the visitor centre. We tried to relocate this enigmatic woodpecker, but it eluded us this time. Overall, these were some birding hours very well spent!

A last visit to the Onlanden brought a kingfisher and another Caspian tern, but the water was still a bit too high for waders.

Day 4: Wadden coast around Lauwersmeer

Sunday 20 August 2023

Lauwersmeer was on the program for today, but because it was warm (26 degrees centigrade) and a Sunday, we opted for some quiet and promising locations around Lauwersmeer instead of the traditional tour around this former sea.

We started in the Kolummerwaard, where we saw, among other species, bearded reedlings, a Savi's warbler, a hunting juvenile white-tailed eagle and... a polecat! The latter was unsuspectingly walking towards us on the same path, until suddenly it noticed us and quickly disappeared into the vegetation. I was just too late for a photo, but that doesn't really matter. Such a golden moment remains etched in the memory!

Via Holwerd, where we once again enjoyed waders nearby, we arrived at the salt marshes of Ternaard. A few weeks ago, some zitting cisticolas were found there, which now seemed to be breeding! We soon found two birds that regularly performed courtship flights above the vegetation. Taking pictures turned out to be almost impossible, but it was a nice observation, especially if you include the bonuses like wheatear, whinchat and bearded reedling!

After lunch at Paessens, during which we saw a little egret, we ended up at the Bochtjesplaat in the Lauwersmeer. Here we found many spotted flycatchers and an Icterine warbler in a bush, amongst many other songbirds. A small pool brought us mostly freshwater waders and ducks, including spotted redshanks, greenshanks, ruff, little stints, snipes and two garganeys.

We ended up in the Ezumakeeg again, the place to be for waders at the moment. And the area did not disappoint! When one of the guests asked me to help him identify a wader which was unknown to him, suddenly and unexpectedly a juvenile red-necked phalarope turned up next to the curlew sandpiper (which is what the unidentified bird turned out to be). What a nice and rare surprise! But the party wasn't over yet, because we also saw a rare pectoral sandpiper, some Temminck's stints, 50+ little stints, 9 Caspian terns and another (adult) white-tailed eagle!

Day 5: Fochteloërveen

Monday 21 August 2023

Today the group had to catch their flights back home, so we had to find a birding destination en route. With a little creativity, you can place Fochteloërveen on a straight line between Zuidhorn and Schiphol, but a better reason to choose this destination was the additions to our species list that this area could offer. Once again we got quite lucky and the last hours turned out to be very fruitful: five short-toed eagles, two white-tailed eagles, two honey buzzards, two red-backed shrikes, four cranes, several whinchats, two crested tits, three common crossbills and quite a few European tree frogs made for a smashing end to a very successful five-day tour!
